"34 So Peter opened his mouth and said: "Truly I understand that God shows no partiality, 35 but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him." - Acts 10:34-35

Read this Week's Scripture

Let me make a couple of general observations before we go into today's text.

- The first, has to do with the importance of repetition. The fact that this story is told in four parts, with the fourth part being a summary of Acts 10 [the first three acts of the story] gives us a clue about its importance. If we are not careful, we can quickly read over the events and say "yeah, yeah, yeah" and think that we've already covered the material. But we need to read it slowly and meditate upon it so that it will impact us as God intended it to impact us.
- The second, has to do with the importance of perspective; we need to keep the timeline of the church in Jerusalem in mind. When we come to the end of the story today, we could be left with the mistaken impression that all is well. But it's not, and that understanding in itself provides a caution that we need to chew on. The consistent theme that we have seen through these four acts is this: God brought the Gentiles into His Kingdom without first making them Jews. I want to update that theme for today's summary message with this takeaway: The power of salvation is not in ourselves but in the message we proclaim.

Question 5: In **Acts 11:15–17**, How did Peter dismiss the idea that the Gentiles were second-class citizens?

Question 6: On "Who" did Peter's defense rest? [Acts 11:17]

Question 7: How did they respond to his testimony? [Acts 11:18]

 What does this show about God's sovereignty in salvation? [2 Timothy 2:25-26; Acts 16:14]

What am I willing to do to take the gospel to those who haven't heard?

Where am I in danger of digging in my heels because of personal preference?
